How has the past shaped the present?

The children completed an interactive tour of Stonehenge and learnt about the origins of the famous stone landmark. In the Aztec themed room, the children discovered more about the jewellery made and worn. As part of our Roman activity, the children learnt how the Romans made roads and why it was so important that they did. They then made models of the Roman roads using the correct layers. Our mighty Viking warriors prepared for battle and made their armour. During our medieval activity, pupils learnt about the key features of a medieval castle and used various recycled materials to create their own model castle. In our final time period our pupils created 3D models of Victorian townhouses as part of the Bridge House community.



World Book Day

At the primary campus, we spent World Book Day exploring the works of Emily Gravett, who is a well-known illustrator.

Catchwater class created their own bookmarks and themed book bunting whilst Bain explored 'The Odd Egg' and guessed what could be inside.

Inspired by the book 'Meerkat Mail', both Billinghay and Barlings classes travelled around the world, designing their own magic carpet, and visiting a drive thru movie and a farm.



Our Year 5 / 6 children from Brant and Bourne spent an exciting couple of days in Stamford on this year's residential trip. Our first day was filled with team building, orienteering, tobogganing, and climbing activities at Tallington Lakes.
